Regular registration continues until Mother's day, May 8th at which point single day, unfilled class registration will begin. On Memorial day, May 25th late registration will begin with an additional \$25.00 late fee. Father's day, June 21st food service registration ends. Onsite registration will be available for Open classes and workshops from 7:30 – 9:00 am during the conference. SCHEDULE

MEALS

BEGINNER'S ACADEMY THURSDAY JUNE 25^{TH} from 1:00 - 4:00

In response to many requests, MAWS is offering Introductory classes in Spinning, Knitting and Weaving. These classes are for beginners wanting to get a taste of their chosen subject. The lessons are being presented by experienced and knowledgeable craftspeople. Each class is three hours which will give beginners a basic introduction and a spring board for further learning. All the materials and equipment are provided in these classes so the student can have fun and get a feel for the craft without having to purchase costly equipment. (Conference registration is not required. These are stand alone classes)

CLASS FEE: \$50 for instruction Each class will have a materials fee to cover the cost of supplies.

BEGINNING SPINNING

Discover the fun of spinning yarn on a wheel! Explore the age-old art that figures in fairy tales. You'll learn the fibers and tools, the purpose of combs and carders, and study the mechanics of the wheel. Skilled spinner Trudy Moffett will show you how to use a short backward draw, how to use a drafting zone, how to apply the correct tension and how to ply your singles. And she'll teach you the lingo, too.

The 2019 theme for the Alpine Weavers and Spinners Guild has been "Fibery Fun". With the "fun" part of this theme in mind, we decided to consolidate our business into three meetings per year and enjoy interesting activities, presentations and each other's company at the rest of our monthly gatherings. In addition to the monthly gatherings for the spinners, weavers and full guild, we added a group called the Freeform gathering. This has been as structured as its name suggests, meeting at various members' homes with focus on a wide variety of fiber-related activities.

The Guild put on its annual three-day demonstration at the Northwest Montana Fair in August. Teresa Knutson did a fabulous job of displaying tools used to create various fiber arts pieces. She, as well as numerous other members demonstrated spinning, weaving and 7-strand braids. The give-away braid kits are a popular item that fairgoers have come to expect at the annual fair.

To encourage new spinners down the path of "Fibery Fun" with their wheels, the Guild hosted a Beginning Spinning workshop in February taught by member Mary Warner. Those spinners have had over six months to practice their skills in preparation for a weekend 3-part workshop taught by Judie Overbeek Oct. 5-6. The more advanced classes included diameter control, plying and novelty yarns.

As we wind down our year of "Fibery Fun", members will participate in a two-part basketry project taught by Vicki Faulkner. We'll end the year with our annual holiday potluck in December. We decided on a theme for the upcoming year of "20/20 Color Vision". The fibery fun shall continue in infinite hues!






The object of the Alpine Weavers and Spinners Guild is to develop the art of weaving and other related crafts.

A little MAWS History...

Barbara Hand, one of the Missoula Weavers Guild members and an accomplished rug weaver, sent me this accounting of the founding of MAWS. I thought it would be interesting reading for our members.

Hi Sharon,

The other day I was looking over the plans for the next MAWS conference and was struck by the growth and success this organization has experienced. It made me look back to the time it all started... I was in London and called Peter Collingwood to see if I could arrange a visit with him. He was not available during the time of my visit, so I asked him if he would consider coming to Missoula to lead a workshop on rug weaving...to my great surprise he said yes! The next summer Barry Huff and I organized a state-wide rug weaving workshop featuring Peter Collingwood. I don't know how many folks are still around to remember that workshop, but we had a great turnout, and a great time. In fact, it was so much fun getting to know so many folks from all over the State we decided we needed to do that again. We got a few people together and made plans for a State wide gathering at the U of M Ballroom. We invited people to bring their best weaving, and made a display, had a nice lunch, and I know we had a few speakers (can't remember who) and suggested that we think about having a statewide guild. We canvassed folks about a name, and after some discussion it was decided to call ourselves Montana Association of Weavers and Spinners or MAWS. It was a very grassroots beginning, I think Bozeman organized the first major conference to great success, and we were off and running. The rest is history so they say. I am very pleased that the organization has done so well, and I am glad I had a small part in getting it started.

I don't know how many people know how things got started, so, I thought it might be good to share my recollections since I am the oldest thing around!
