

Summer and Winter Workshop by Annette Schipf

Join the Billings Weavers Guild May 1-2, 2025 for SUMMER AND WINTER: THE SUPERHERO BLOCK WEAVE



If you have been weaving any length of time at all, you have probably woven Summer and Winter. Next to twill and tabby Annette believes it is one of the most versatile & widely used of all the weave structures. One can weave delicate figured baby items or sturdy weft faced rugs. It can be used for clothing or household textiles; towels, pillows, runners.....it is a superhero weave!

Even if you have woven this structure do you really know it? In this class we will weave samples that will show the different ways to weave "traditional" Summer & Winter. Then using the same threading we will weave some "untraditional" Summer & Winter. Designing different projects by using the structure in different ways will be covered – from weft-faced Taquete, to turned Summer & Winter, to weaving objects like sheep or hearts.

If you are a beginning weaver you will be amazed at the scope of this weave structure and its possibilities. If you are a more experienced weaver you will have a reference to use so you can design your own projects the way YOU want them.

Students can use a 4 shaft or 8 shaft loom for the class and will weave all their samples on their own loom. Either 4 harness or 8 harness drafts will be provided by Annette. There will be a sample notebook with handouts and page protectors for your finished samples so you can refer to it whenever you choose to use this superhero weave structure.

Beginners through experienced weavers will become their own superhero weavers with Summer & Winter! Click here to print the <u>PDF flyer</u> which has examples of what can be woven with this structure.

This year's Guild theme is "Start-to-Finish", and we hope to literally explore this theme. We purchased two Shetland fleeces from member Mary Warner and will work with this wool throughout the year. In January, we started at the beginning by learning to skirt the fleeces and scour the wool. These photos of "Fred's" fleece demonstrate what a difference some soap and hot water can make. Fred is one of those guys who cleans up nicely!

In February, we will learn how to use various tools to process this fleece into ready-to-spin fiber. Stay tuned to follow Fred's transformation from dirty wool to a finished object.

Billings Weavers Guild

Billings Weavers Guild meets the second Saturday of the month at 1 pm on the second Saturday of the month at 2950 King Avenue West, Billings. Meetings are always open to beginners and visitors.

At our November 9 meeting on Ruth Terry discussed calculating warp yardage and all the other details. She shared several project planning sheets and sources including: lunaticfringeyarns.com. Use the sitemap and scroll to "Plan Your Warp" and "Plan Your Project" to access PDF's for those worksheets. There is also a reed substitution chart available. Lunatic Fringe offers an online workshop for winding a warp with a raddle cross titled "You Gotta be Warped to Weave" which Ruth highly recommended. Other resources she recommended include schacthspindle.com where you can search for the "Warp and Weft Calculator". This calculator allows you to enter values and calculates the yarn requirements. The woolery.com also has a Warp & Weft Calculation form you can print. At weavingwithjanetdawson.com you can search for the "Weaving Project Calculator" downloadable form. mbrassard.com also has a "Warp and Weft Calculations" printable form.

The Guild had a successful sales booth at the Yellowstone Art Museum's Winter Fair December 5. Members woven items sold well and we continue to introduce weaving to the public. At our December Christmas brunch, we had a very fun Christmas exchange game with lots of action designed by Camille Palmer.

In January Ruth Terry and Nancy Anderson tackled warping - front to back and back to front. There were lots of tips and practical advice for both methods. One idea was to use knitting markers on the edge of bouts when there is a particular pattern that continues from one bout to the next. Using markers that are the

same color make it easy to match up the bouts as you put them on the loom. Another idea is to use loopers (used for making potholders) as choke ties when winding your warps. Handles tied on to the same leg of your warp cross and/or threading cross also make handling the warps easier when putting them on the loom. Painters tape (blue tape) is a handy way to hold the warp rod on the loom.

The guild plans two workshops open to all MAWS members. First, May 1-2 2025 guild workshop with Annette Schipf on Summer and Winter. Also Robyn Spady will be coming to Billings this fall October 17-19 2025. The subject of her class has not yet been chosen. Those interested are encouraged to check her website to look at the topics she covers and let guild members know.
