1/14/2023 Dorset Buttons by Pat Olski 10 am MST

Learn the 400-year-old Dorset Button technique with this hands-on class. A simple supply list and directions will be provided once you register. No prior experience is necessary to learn this simple technique. Use these buttons for your woven, knit and crocheted projects or as jewelry, shawl pins, hair clips, and ornaments. Pat Olski is the editor of Piecework and author of Crafting Thread Shawl Pins and other books. Pat is a knitter, crocheter, French hand sewist, guilter, tatter, lacemaker, embroiderer, and needlepointer and in the last years, has discovered a love for Dorset buttons. 2/11/2023 18th Century Knitted Latrine Hat by Barbara Landry, Dr. Annamarie Hatcher 10 am MST A well-preserved 200-year-old knitted hat found during the excavation of the Fortress of Louisbourg in Nova Scotia has opened a peep-hole into life in the 18th century. Learn the steps taken to preserve the artifact and recreate its pattern. Barbara Kelly-Landry is a native of Cape Breton and a long-time employee of the Fortress of Louisbourg National Historic Site. 3/11/2023 Fan Reeds to Create Ondulé Textiles by Norma Smayda Staley 10 am MST

The Ondulé reed is a truly amazing and beautiful tool. This reed has groups of dents converging in alternate fan shapes. By weaving at different reed heights, the warp ends move to create vertical undulation. Trained in the Norwegian weaving tradition, Norma Smayda established the Saunderstown Weaving school in 1974. She is the co-author of Ondulé Textiles: Weaving Contours with a Fan Reed and Weaving Designs by Bertha Gray Hayes: Miniature Overshot Patterns. **Fee \$10 Must register by 3/8/2023**

4/1/2023 Introduction to Supplementary Warp Weaving by Deb Essen 10 am MST

What are supplemental warps and how do they work? A quick tour/introduction to the weave structures woven with supplemental warps. Deb Essen, from the Bitterroot Valley in Montana, is the author of "Easy Weaving with Supplemental Warps" and is a frequent contributor for Handwoven magazine. She also has recorded several DVDs on Supplemental Warps, Pile Weaves with Supplemental Warps, Unlocking Profile Drafts, and Pin Loom Projects. Weaving for over 25 years, Deb teaches at local, regional and national conferences, guilds and shops.
